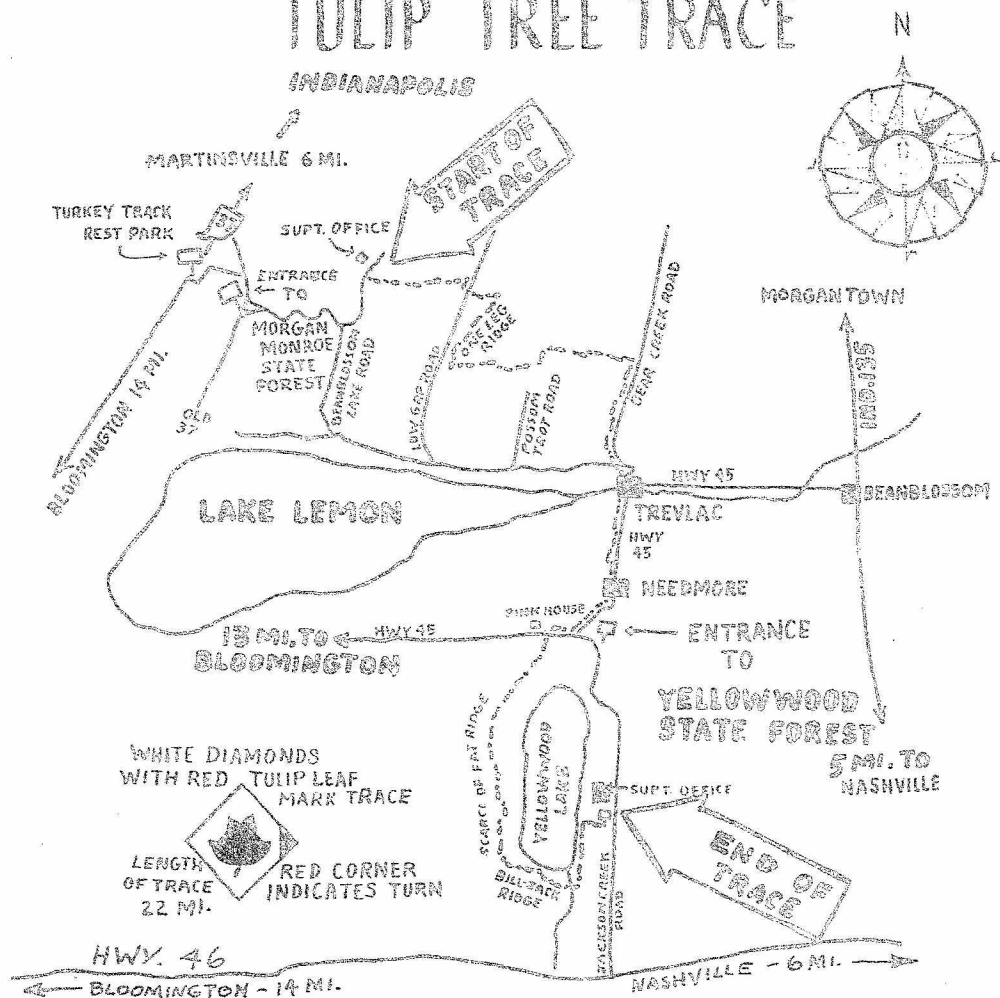


TULIP TREE TRACE

CONDUCT

It is essential that hikers maintain a high standard of courtesy and consideration toward the state and private property through which they pass. UNIT LEADERS ARE REQUESTED TO MAKE SURE THAT KNIVES AND AXES ARE NOT CARRIED. Acts of vandalism along the Trace could result in its being closed. Keep it clean and help us maintain its beauty and our good relations with the property owners so that those who follow you can enjoy the natural surroundings.

FOOD

You may purchase things to eat at the grocery store in Trevlac or in Needmore. Please do not leave refuse behind you as you hike the Trace.

CAMPING FACILITIES

Overnight camping facilities are available at both ends of the Trace. For accommodations in the Morgan-Monroe State Forest, write the Superintendent at R.R. 3, Martinsville. Two cabins are located in this forest: The Rosenbaum and the Draper. The Rosenbaum will handle up to 30 people, while the Draper will handle up to 15. There are also two camping areas in this forest. The Rosenbaum camp grounds will handle up to 100, while the new camp grounds will handle up to 500. For cabin camping, bring a cot or air mattress.

For accommodations in the Yellowwood State Forest, write the Superintendent at R.R. 1, Nashville. The Yellowwood has two camping areas. The south grounds will handle up to 100 while the north grounds will hold up to 300.

Each superintendent has been instructed by the Indiana Department of Conservation to charge 25c
